- Thomas Becket born in London in 1118.
- In 1142, became a clerk to the Archbishop of Canterbury

- Performed his duties well, so following the year King Henry appointed him Chancellor of the realm
- This post was second to the king.

In 1154, rose to the position of Archdeacon of Canterbury

- Initially, the king and Becket seemed to be good friends.
- Becket worked hard and effectively

- In 1162, king Henry appointed him Archbishop of Canterbury
- Becket refused and thought this post might bring him into opposition to the King

- King wanted to have authority over church.
- Becket opposed this.

• A lot of pressure was built on Becket to sign his consent but he declined to put his seal.

In 1170, King Henry decided to hold the coronation for his eldest son Prince Henry and persuaded the Archbishop of York and London.

It was the right of the Archbishop of Canterbury to crown the Kings of England.

- Becket saw this an infringement of his rights .
- The King gave him an exile.

After exile, he reached Canterbury to preach his Christmas sermon for the year 1170.

Murdered on 29th December in his Cathedral by four Knights - Reginald Fitz Urse, William de Traci, Hugh de Morville and Richard Brito.

- T.S. Eliot
- Full name ThomasStearns Eliot
- Born in St. Louis, Missouri on 26th September, 1888.

- Father Henry Ware Eliot
- Mother Charlotte Champe Stearns (School teacher and a social worker and advocated women's rights.

- Chichester saw The Rock (play) and admired it.
- Asked Eliot to write a play for the Canterbury festival of 1935.
- He write Murder in the Cahtedral.

The play deals with the martyrdom of Thomas Becket- one of the greatest of english saints- who was the Archbishop of Canterbury from

- Four Knights
- Attendants

- The first scene is the Archbishop's Hall on December 2, 1170.
- The second scene is in the Cathedral on December,
 29, 1170.

MURDER IN THE CATHEDRAL

The play begins – early December, 1170 with the chorus which comprises of the poor women of Canterbury.

- •Archbishop had returned after seven years of exile in France (1164-1171).
- Chorus feared of something terrible would be happened

MURDER IN THE CATHEDRAL

- Becket was aware of the dangers in his return to Canterbury
- Four tempters came to tempt him.

First tempts - tempts Becket with the time of his past and tells him to go back to those days and forget about his spiritual intensity.

- Becket with the time when he was the Chancellor to the King and enjoyed secular and political power.
- Tells Becket that real power is in this world and not in the next.

- The third tempter tells
 Becket to team up with the
 church and the Barons
 against monarchy.
- Becket's reply no one shall say that I betrayed a King

Tempters

- The fourth tempter tempts Becket with his own pride and pride of achieving martyrdom.
- Becket's reply Who are you tempting with my own

After the fourth temptation, Becket sinks into despair and says: "Is there no way, in my soul's sickness, Does not lead to damnation in pride?"

- They came from France claiming that they have urgent business with the king.
- They accused Becket of ingratitude to King Henry II who made him the

Becket's reply litely defends himself by arguing that loyalty to God does not imply disloyalty to the King.

The Knights ask Becket to leave England but he refuses saying that he has the sanction of the Pope in Rome.

- The Knights went away.
- The priests request Becket to hide in the Cathedral in case the knights return again

- Becket refuses to do so and states that God will protect him.
- The knights murder Becket and the chorus laments along with the priests.

The priests feel that the church is strengthened by Becket's martyrdom

The knights address the audience arguing that their loyalty to the king made them implement their act.

The Priests The priests dismiss the knights as "lost souls".
